Regular Monthly Meeting
6:30 P.M.**

Tonight's Meeting had to be relocated to the Three Mile Bay Fire Hall due to the significant numbers of attendees, interested in current Wind Energy awareness.

Supervisor Aubertine opened tonight's meeting at 6:36.p.m. with a Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance.

Present at tonight's meeting: Supervisor Aubertine, Councilmen Countryman, Harris, Johnson and Bourquin, Highway Superintendent Pat Weston, ZBA Member Harry Staudenmayer, Assessor Roz Gotham, Bookkeeper Cathy Satterly, and approximately 100 others.

Supervisor's Report

Cathy Satterly presented the June 2010 Supervisor's Report.

RESOLUTION 2010 – 79: Motion by Councilman Countryman and seconded by Councilman Johnson approving the June 2010 Supervisor's Report as presented by Ms. Satterly. Five ayes. Motion carried.

Superintendent's Report – Pat Weston:

Superintendent Weston provided the Board Members with copies of the bills and shared services information that has been submitted to the County. The

total amount to be paid to the Town for services rendered is \$43,391.47, which in turn brings the shared services debt with the County to \$860.25.

Construction on the Hardscrabble Road is underway and they are hoping to reach completion on the project by mid August. The Highway Department is also doing “patch work” maintenance on South Shore Road, Point Peninsula.

Some of the residents have contacted Pat in regard to the speed limit on the South Shore Road Extension. The County and Leo have been contacted and Pat is waiting for someone to provide him the information.

The dozer has undergone an extensive amount of repairs recently. The transmission was not moving; it was examined and found that the transmission was not circulating oil thru the oil cooler. Anderson did some troubleshooting and found no T/C outlet pressure to the cooler. After researching the issue it was determined that a tube inside the tractor frame was cracked, allowing oil to dump to the transmission sump and not get routed thru the cooler as needed. The transmission was removed and they found one tube cracked from the frame. The tube was replaced and reinforced per cat update. Parts were assembled and the pressure was tested, it was within CAT specifications. They pushed with the dozer and got the transmission temperature in the red. They stopped pushing and the oil cooled as it should and the gauge went down. The unit now operates correctly.

Municipal Water Board Report – Written Report by Marsha Barton

Water District #5 – The Water Board will be reviewing the restoration work in August. Restoration sign-off letters will be sent to all customers in September. Gregor Smith is getting together all the information required by Rural Development as to the possibility of using the \$100,000 left over to go up Cheever Road with the water line.

Water Tower Painting/Cleaning – Marsha will be meeting with Gregor Smith to complete the specs for the bid.

Water Facility – Tim Mason will be doing some minor repairs at the water facility, cosmetic and safety issues. Revenues are up from last year.

Information on Refinancing Loans / Combining Districts – A question was presented regarding whether the loan in Water District #2 might be refinanced to possibly lower the interest rate. Rural Development does not refinance loans. A check of the rates of all the Water Districts has shown that all rates are in the same range. There was also a question regarding combining districts. Water Districts are entities, therefore cannot simply be combined. There would be quite a lengthy legal process involved in dissolving the districts. All customers would have to agree to the idea.

Three Mile Bay Cemetery Report – Julia Gosier

Julie has some concerns with the progress on the vault. She is urging the Board to make a decision to proceed with the much-needed work on the building.

Planning Board Report – Chairman Paul Norton

An Open House was held at the Copley House as another step in the process of adopting the Comprehensive Plan. There were a hand full of people that attended. Andy Nevin had a power point presentation with an open discussion afterward. At the last meeting the Planning Board set a date of August 18, for a public hearing to be held at the Chaumont Fire Hall based on availability. This is also a necessary step in the adoption process. Mr. Nevin also informed the Planning Board that the County would be available to help them with updating the Town's current Zoning Laws based on this adopted plan. This would be a great service to the Town.

There was no Police Report turned in for the month of June.

Youth Committee Report – Charlie Mount

Baseball is being wrapped up for the season; all the fields have been in use. There were 44 teams involved in the Willie Putnam Tournament.

The Summer Rec Program started July 5th. They have approximately 70 – 75 children attending the program each day. Monday's and Wednesday's are spent at the Village Beach and Friday's are a travel day. Stephanie Doney has planned some exciting day trips for the program.

There was no ZEO Report for the month of June.

Old Business

Wind Survey Finalities

Supervisor Aubertine stated that the Town Board must decide how they will proceed with the survey.

Councilman Johnson indicated that at the last meeting a Motion was made to use the questions that Supervisor Aubertine had suggested. With all the recent feedback the Town Board has received in the past couple of weeks Councilman Johnson feels it is necessary to add one more question. Do you want wind turbines in the Town of Lyme? Yes or no. Those attending tonight's meeting applauded Councilman Johnson's statement.

Supervisor Aubertine received some suggestions as to how to proceed with the next survey. To be valid, the questionnaire needs to ensure that the data collected reflects the feelings of those respondents being queried, but also needs to collect the data from all those potentially impacted. To be valid, the entire population of interest needs to be part of the questionnaire sampling.

Simply put, does the survey ask the questions we want answers to? Moreover, to be valid, one must ensure the survey is not limited to a sub-set or segment of the population, but rather reflects the opinions of the entire survey population.

It is important that the format is straightforward in that the questions are closed ended (they do not require a narrative response to be interpreted, but rather only allow yes / no answers which are simply tabulated).

A suggested survey is as follows:

PLEASE ANSWER BOTH QUESTIONS

With a single mark for Question 1,
And a single mark for Question 2.

1. What is your opinion of industrial wind turbines in the Town of Lyme?
_____ In favor (A)
_____ Not in favor (B)

2. If Industrial Wind Turbines were to come to Lyme, do you favor
_____ (A) The Draft Zoning Law established in 2008 as a result of the prior Wind Survey, with thw limits of 5 decibles above ambient (ambient being existing background sound levels), and held 4,500 feet away from the waterfront (Lake and River), and population center boundaries.

Or

____ (B) the less restrictive Zoning Law being revised by the Town Council (with sound level increases, and lower setbacks from population centers and waterfront).

The Survey Interpretation will be in the following way:

Question 1:

If (A) is the majority, the Board will consider Question 2.

If (B) is the majority, the Board will task the Planning Board to draft an amendment to pursue zoning to restrict, and/or prohibit turbines in Lyme.

Question 2:

If (A) is the majority, the Board will accept the Draft Law in principle, and turn it back to the Planning Board for minor adjustments with input as desired by the Planning Board, at which time the Draft Law will be brought back to the Town Board for ratification.

If (B) is the majority, the Board will continue their work sessions to revise the law with the adjustments the Town Board sees as suitable.

Supervisor Aubertine opened the floor for public comments.

John Podeszek – Feels that there will be flaws in the survey method.

Steve Rutigliano – Asking the Board why the second question of the survey should be answered if you answer not in favor?

Glen Goldberg – Concerns with the questions on the survey.

Scott Discount – **Stated** that every taxpayer should get an equal vote. One vote for one person.

Joel Block – what about full time residents who do not own property. Supervisor Aubertine stated that he wants to include residents and taxpayers to receive a survey.

Dick Christie – The survey doesn't get to the advantages and disadvantages of wind power. What does a kilowatt of electricity cost? People will be voting with their emotions, not the facts.

Supervisor Aubertine – We are going to have to go back to scratch. We as a Town need to find out how standard PILOT programs benefit the Towns. Voters for Wind and the Golden Crescent Coalition have done a good job getting the information out.

Bert Bowers – The Town of Orleans has done a nice job of investigating. They have formed a committee to look into wind power; health, safety, economics, etc. They had people who were sent out to gather information and report back to the group. We need to take into account all the variables. Bert suggested the Town of Lyme set up a committee made up of individuals that could take the time to investigate all the aspects of wind development. Hopefully this would help bring the community back together. We need to be in control and we need to decide what is best for our community.

Dick Nagel – Backed up what Bert said. He would like to see what the economic impact would be. Feels it is important to pull all the pieces together.

Stanley Buzzell – Fire Road 57 – Mr. Buzzell is employed by National Grid. He asked the question as to whom among the meeting attendees tonight has gone to visit Lewis County to look at the wind mills. Most everyone in attendance raised his or her hand. He spoke about the wind turbines in Chateaugay that have not been "spinning". The Chateaugay School District was supposed to receive \$300,000 per year from the project. When all was said and done their State Aid was denied because they were getting the \$300,000 per year from the wind revenues.

Betty Lou Kirshler – The wind turbines in Lewis County are on a hill. She asked how many people here have been to Wolf Island. The wind turbines in Scranton, Pennsylvania are located in the mountains.

Mr. Egby - Ask the people on Wolfe Island what they think. When he sees wind turbines he sees jobs gone to Europe.

Scott Discount – Feels the Town Board should extend the Moratorium and appoint a citizens committee made up of people who are for and against the

wind power. Once these people are informed send out the survey and have it go out to the entire Town.

Eric McDermott – Where are private turbines in all of this?

Supervisor Aubertine stated that he would like to address the situation for private turbines as well.

Julia Gosier – Has concerns with the idea of a new survey. No matter how good a survey looks, have a professional entity review it before it is sent to the residents. There is no sense of sending a survey that will cause confusion.

Charles Sidwa – Who will be able to respond to the survey?

Sherry Carr – People have screwed around for 2 or 3 years now and yet the wind companies have not pulled out. What's in it for them? Chateaugay never produced power yet the turbines stay. He feels we should quit the whole damn thing!

Greg Powell – Who sets the setbacks? Before a survey is sent make sure everybody has the information to make an informed decision.

Dick Christie – If we can't talk we'll never get the information we need to make an informed decision. Let people know what the Town stands to gain annually.

Dick Nagel – There are a lot of Town's going through what we are going through. Why don't we go to the Town's who have already gathered all the necessary information?

Monica Boturla - We are beating a dead horse. Put the survey on hold until the Town gathers all the information. Get it straight; bring it back to the residents so they can make an informed decision.

Betty Lou Kishler – The US Government is funding wind turbines. These companies will stay here until they get what they want.

Supervisor Aubertine – Thanked everyone for his or her comments.

RESOLUTION 2010 - 86: Motion by Supervisor Aubertine and seconded by Councilman Countryman TABLING the idea of the survey, stay under the Moratorium, set up a committee and gather information. Once we are confident of the information, get it out to the Town residents.

Three yeas. Two nays. Motion carried.

Councilman Johnson has concerns with this decision. He stated that the Town Board has been working on this project for three and a half years. Some of our current Board Members were not members when we started. In the beginning there was an economic value of \$900,000 for 60 turbines. The Town Board has seen through what has been discussed and we are trying to get wind power in the Town of Lyme. There is a right place in the Town of Lyme for turbines. Councilman Johnson feels we should get the survey out with the additional question added to it. He agrees with Mr. Carr and feels this is a stalling tactic for the taxpayers. We need a Zoning Law addressing the Wind situation, even if the survey comes back “no”. We need the input from the surveys to proceed.

Richard Freshour – No longer puts his faith in corporate America.

Brent Kowalski – Are there any Town Board members involved in contracts?

Privilege of the Floor was closed at 7:45 p.m.

Councilman Johnson – It is important that we move forward.

Councilwoman Harris – Move forward with the survey. We will get people from both sides to work on a committee. We need to find out information regarding the effects on School State Aid and property values.

Councilman Bourquin – Would like to hire someone to do a professional survey.

Councilman Johnson stated at the last Town Board meeting we passed a resolution to send out another wind survey.

RESOLUTION 2010 - 87: Motion by Councilwoman Harris and seconded by Supervisor Aubertine amending Resolution 2010 – 78: approving the two-question survey proposed by Supervisor Aubertine. A survey will be sent out at a later date with modifications deemed necessary.

Cape Trail Plan – The Cape Vincent Improvement League is hoping to convert an unused section of the rail line into a scenic trail. The first phase of the project calls for the construction of a roughly 3-mile gravel trail, which would start near the Village docks on Broadway and extend to Favret Road near the Town Transfer Site on Wilson Road. In the long run, the Improvement League hopes to extend the nonmotorized trail to the banks of the Chaumont River. The Town Board will take no action nor show support of the implementation of the trail until they see the long-range plans.

DEC and DOT – Boat Launches, Marinas and Ice Fishing

There are plans proposed for the old Bachy's Marina. They would like to take down the old buildings and dredge. They have done a beautiful job in Three Mile Bay. They have agreed to make more grassy areas for picnic tables and they will be planting some trees. The DEC no longer wants the metal building.

Councilwoman Harris stated that Carla Melgrem from the Tug Hill Commission has indicated that there is funding available for farmers markets, food pantries and food co-ops. Councilwoman Harris has also looked into the possibility of ice fishing parking and has found that there are funds available for that program as well.

New Business

Supervisor Aubertine's Appointment of Deputy – Effective August 1st
Councilman Warren A. Johnson will be appointed to the Deputy
Supervisor's position. Councilman Johnson is the senior Councilman and is
accepting the appointment to the position.

As far as the vacancy is concerned, a qualified person can be appointed. The
person must possess the qualifications of the person being replaced, must be
18 years of age, a registered voter, and a Town resident. The Town Board
could go two or three months before filling the position.

Councilman Johnson's perception is that the position should be filled in the
General Election; appoint the person that is voted in.

Garden Club Request – Cathy Carr

Cathy Carr submitted a letter on behalf of Melanie Southwell. Mel has been
with the garden club for over seven years. She has done an outstanding job
of planting and maintaining the numerous areas that have enhanced all of the
public and many of the privately held areas in Town. In the past Mel has
been on the Town payroll and been paid out of the Town funds designated
for the Garden Club.

The current Lyme Garden Club Board will not allow Melani to work in the
Village or Town without insurance. By adding her to the Town payroll, she
can get started on Town wide landscape maintenance. She has not been
allowed to do any work in the Town due to her lack of insurance coverage.

The Garden Club is requesting that Melani be paid through the Town. This
would allow her to be insured under the Town plan while still allowing her
to do the landscape maintenance.

The Lyme Garden Club currently maintains many of the public properties in
the Town including, the Chaumont Post Office, Chaumont Fire Hall, Three
Mile Bay Fire Hall, Dr Haas Memorial Garden, Water Facility, Tennis
Courts, and up until this year the Chaumont River Bridge abutment areas on
both sides.

In addition, Mel prunes, mulches and waters over 150 trees planted over the
past 15 years.

Melani is absolutely necessary for the success of our beautification program. Her continued ability to work is vital to maintain the improvements made thus far in the Town.

Ms. Carr stated that a lot of work is done on public property. Fifteen or sixteen years ago there was no landscaping done on public property. She feels there has to be a way that the Town and Village could find the money to make this work.

Supervisor Aubertine stated as the Chief Financial Officer, they did not budget for it this year. It is a concern to the Board because she would be able to collect unemployment insurance and workers comp. If the Garden Club could submit some figures to the Town Board at budget time it may be considered. People on the payroll add to the Town's expenditures, we pay a premium for health benefits.

Three Mile Bay Baptist Church – The Town Board is directing George Perkins to assess the amount of debris that will be brought to the Transfer Site by the Church. As the Transfer Site Superintendent, he will be able to negotiate reasonable charges for tipping fees.

The Town vehicles will not transport any of the brush but the Highway Superintendent indicated that he would be willing to lend a hand with his personal vehicle.

Transfer Site Hours

The Town Board and Clerk's Office have been hearing from many residents who have voiced concerns over the Transfer Site's new hours. Superintendent Weston is finding twice the garbage and old tires along side of the roadways. There are more people walking into the Transfer Site when it is closed.

RESOLUTION 2010 - 88: Motion by Councilman Countryman and seconded by Councilman Johnson reversing the Transfer Site hours from May 1st through October 1st and returning them to Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday's open from 9:a.m through 6:00 p.m. and Tuesday and Friday's open from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The Transfer Site will be closed on Monday and Thursday's. October through April the Transfer Site

hours will be limited to Wednesday, Friday and Saturdays 9:00 a.m. through 6:00 p.m.

Julia Gosier – Has a concern with the work being done in the Three Mile Bay Cemetery by Transfer Site employees. She stated that George is doing a fantastic job and she feels the work being done is better than ever. The old cemetery is very difficult to work in and she doesn't want to see things change,

RESOLUTION 2010 - 89: Motion by Councilman Bourquin and seconded by Councilman Countryman approving an advertisement for part-time help at the Transfer Site. Five ayes. Motion carried.

Cemetery Vault Quotes

The Town has received quotes for the Three Mile Bay Cemetery Vault from Carl Savage, Tim Mason and RSI Roofing. Superintendent Gosier has no problem going with the low bid. She expressed her concerns with going with real slate for the roof and asking the taxpayers to pay for that. Julie feels that the new roofing products are successful and attractive. It is not a historic structure and Julie feels that the synthetic materials are more than acceptable. Julie also expressed her concerns with the integrity of the building itself and feels it has been terribly compromised. The roof will have to be torn down and rebuilt.

Julia Gosier – Feels it would be good business to ask for a detailed budget from any of the not for profit – nonprofit organizations that receive budgeted funds. It is important to be able to show the taxpayers where the money goes.
